Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee Hears Bills

Today, the Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee, chaired by Senator Beverly Gossage (R-Eudora), met virtually to hold hearings on the following bills:

<u>Senate Bill 193</u> removes law enforcement agencies and officers from the Kansas Board of Pharmacy's statewide opioid antagonist protocol.

Ed Klumpp, Kansas Association of Chiefs of Police was a proponent, and there were no other conferees.

<u>Senate Bill 145</u> requires immediate notification of a report of abuse or neglect to a law enforcement agency and provides for law enforcement agencies to request resources from the secretary of the Kansas Department for Children and Families.

The committee is scheduled to meet on Thursday, Feb. 13, to hold a hearing on <u>Senate Bill 67</u>, which authorizes registered nurse anesthetists to engage in independent practice and prescribe drugs and prohibits registered nurse anesthetists from performing an abortion or prescribing drugs to induce an abortion.

Senate Commerce Committee Hears Occupational Licensure Bill

Today, the Senate Commerce Committee, chaired by Senator Larry Alley (R-Winfield), met virtually to hold a hearing on Senate Bill 229. The bill provides for the termination of all current and new occupational licensing requirements adopted by an agency or enacted by the legislature after five years unless extended by a joint resolution of the legislature, requiring that the adoption of new occupational licensing requirements by a state agency be approved by a joint resolution of the legislature and providing for notice to agencies and the legislature and a procedure for legislative review of such occupational licensing requirements. The following agencies are exempt: the Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board, Kansas Board of Examiners in

Optometry, Kansas State Board of Nursing, Kansas Dental Board, Kansas State Board of Healing Arts, Kansas Board of Pharmacy or any other regulatory agency for health care providers established by state law. "Agency" does not include the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions.

The committee also heard from neutral conferee Clay Barker with the Kansas Secretary of State's office, who raised concerns on mechanics on implementation and flagged a few possible clarifications needed.

Governor Vetoes First Bill of 2025 Session

Yesterday, Governor Laura Kelly vetoed the first bill of the 2025 session. Senate Bill 63, restricts the use of state funds to promote gender transitioning, prohibits health care providers from providing gender transition care to children whose gender identity is inconsistent with the child's sex, authorizes a civil cause of action against health care providers for providing such treatments, requires professional discipline against a health care provider who performs such treatment, prohibits professional liability insurance from covering damages for health care providers that provide gender transition treatment to children and adds violation of the act to the definition of unprofessional conduct for physicians. The legislation had previously passed the Senate on a vote of 32-8, and the House on a vote of 83-35. The legislature will likely take up a veto-override attempt in the coming days.

Senate Ways and Means Hears Bills

Today, the Senate Ways and Means Committee, chaired by Senator Rick Billinger (R-Goodland), held hearings on the following:

<u>Senate Bill 101</u> creates the drug abuse resistance education (DARE) educator position. Proponents:

- Randy Combs with the Office of the Attorney General
- Rhonda and Andrew Burris private citizens who lost their son to a drug overdose.

The committee also heard from Representative Robyn Essex (R-Olathe) who supported the legislation.

<u>Senate Bill 214</u> enacts the Attorney Training Program for Rural Kansas Act to provide financial assistance to lawyers and law students who practice law in rural areas.
