

KHA's Capitol Comments February 18, 2025

House Debates and Passes Bills

Today, the Kansas House took final votes on a long list of legislation and looks to continue their work into the evening. The Kansas House took final votes on following health-related bills:

<u>House Bill 2110</u> eliminates the requirement that the Kansas 911 Board contract with a local collection point administrator for services, reschedules the date on which the Kansas 911 Operations Fund, Kansas 911 Grant Fund and Kansas 911 Fund shall be established, requires certain transfers. Passed 119-0.

<u>House Bill 2170</u> designates the first week of February as Kansas Burn Awareness Week. The bill passed on a vote of <u>91-28</u>.

Other bills with final votes in the House today include:

<u>House Bill 2031</u> permits driving school instructors to possess a motorcycle driver's license from any state. Passed <u>117-2</u>.

<u>House Bill 2117</u> modifies certain business filing and fee requirements for business trusts, foreign corporations and limited partnerships; authorizes professional corporations or limited liability companies formed or organized to render a professional service to participate in transactions under the Business Entity Transactions Act. Passed <u>118-1</u>.

<u>House Bill 2124</u> designates a portion of US Highway 160 as the CPL Monte Wayne Forrest Memorial Highway. Passed 119-0.

<u>Sub House Bill 2145</u> establishes the Butler County Fair Board to consist of 15 members. Passed 118-1.

<u>House Bill 2185</u> updates the Kansas National Guard Education Assistance Act to include dependents of National Guard members and the Kansas National Guard Educational Master for the Enhanced Readiness and Global Excellence Program to include other advanced degrees. The bill passed 112-6.

<u>House Bill 2215</u> modifies the definition of public-private partnership to increase the allowable cost-share limit for expenditures by the Kansas Department of Corrections on certain correctional institution construction projects. Passed 119-0.

These bills will now go to the Senate for further review and debate.

The House also debated today, the following bills:

<u>House Bill 2116</u> requires that certain contractual provisions be incorporated in all contracts for certain cities and counties, including the provisions of form DA-146a, with certain exceptions. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2158</u> permits beekeepers who meet certain requirements to sell packaged honey and honeycombs without holding a food establishment or food processing plant license under the Kansas Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2155</u> specifies that sheriffs have liability for official acts related to the charge and custody of jails. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2280</u> clarifies that the authorized activities of paramedics, advanced EMTs, EMTs and medical responders may be authorized upon the order of a health care professional permitting certain ambulance services to offer service for less than 24 hours per day, every day of the year, and requires entities using automated external defibrillators to register with the Emergency Medical Services Board. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2016</u> includes private online obituary notices as sufficient grounds for removing a deceased voter from voter registration books. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2118</u> requires any person who solicits a fee for filing or retrieving certain documents from the federal government, the state, a state agency or a local government to give certain notices to consumers and provides that violation of such requirements is a deceptive act or practice subject to penalties under the Kansas Consumer Protections Act. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2182</u>, prohibits a sheriff from charging a fee for service of process for proceedings under the Protection from Abuse Act and the Protection from Stalking, Sexual Assault or Human Trafficking Act. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2062</u> provides for a child support order for unborn children from the date of conception. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2039</u> amends definitions in the Kansas Credentialing Act to provide that certain entities providing physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech-language pathology are not home health agencies. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2075</u> requires that a permanency hearing for a child in the custody of the secretary be held within nine months from such child's removal from the home. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Bill 2083</u> provides a property tax exemption for new energy storage systems and excludes new energy storage systems from the commercial and industrial machinery and equipment exemption. Recommended for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>House Sub for House Bill 2007</u> – the House budget bill. The bill was amended in the following ways:

- Move \$500,000 from the Judiciary for contract Fire and EMS services at Larned State Hospital.
- Representative Suzanne Wikle (D-Lawrence) brought an amendment to expand Medicaid and the amendment failed on a vote of 34-82.
- Language to add \$1 million to the Kansas Department of Commerce Budget.

Senate Debates and Passes Bills

Today, the Kansas Senate debated a long list of bills that were before their chamber and will continue to work throughout tomorrow.

<u>Sub for Senate Bill 67</u> authorizes registered nurse anesthetists to prescribe, procure and administer drugs consistent with the CRNA education and qualifications. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 82</u> requires the secretary of the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services to grant physical environment waivers for certain rural emergency hospitals to provide skilled nursing facility care. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 126</u> enacts the Physician Assistant Licensure Compact to provide interstate practice privileges for physician assistants. The Senate recommended it favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 70</u> provides for fees for electronic copies of records under the Open Records Act. The bill was amended to include the Kansas Department of Veterans Affairs. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote as further amended.

<u>Senate Bill 23</u> requires agents and insurers to respond to inquiries from the Insurance Commissioner within 14 calendar days. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 88</u> requires the state long-term care ombudsman and regional ombudsman to receive training in memory care. The Senate recommended the bill for final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 85</u> directs the secretary of the Kansas Department for Children and Families to review and compare data for Public Assistance Program eligibility. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 161</u> requires legislation approval prior to any state agency seeking or implementing a Public Assistance Program waiver from the federal government that expands eligibility for any Public Assistance Program or increases costs to the state. The Senate saw a motion by Senator Pat Pettey to add Medicaid expansion to the bill. The motion failed on a vote of <u>12-28</u>. The Senate recommended the bill favorable for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 87</u> expands the student eligibility for the tax credit for the Low-Income Students Scholarship Program. The Senate amended the bill to strike the increase to the tax credit limit.

<u>Senate Bill 50</u> establishes uniform interest rate provisions for service scholarship programs administered by the Kansas Board of Regents that have repayment obligations. The Senate amended the bill to strike the increase to the tax credit limit.

<u>Senate Bill 44</u> expands the postsecondary educational institutions eligible to participate in the Kansas Promise Scholarship Program. The Senate did increase the \$10 million to \$15 million and recommended it favorably for a final vote as amended.

<u>Sub. for Senate Bill 29</u> removes the authority of the county or joint board of health or local health officer to prohibit public gatherings when necessary for the control of infectious disease. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 71</u> increases the criminal penalties for buying sexual relations, removes provisions regarding city ordinances related to the act and requires certain offenders to complete an educational or treatment program. The Senate recommended it favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 138</u> requires search warrants to be issued only on the statement of facts sufficient to show probable cause made by a law enforcement officer. The Senate recommended it favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 30</u> requires the secretary of the Kansas Department of Labor to conduct a state and national criminal history record check on employees who have access to federal tax information received directly from the Internal Revenue Service. The Senate recommended it favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 78</u> requires postsecondary educational institutions to regularly review and update accreditation policies, prohibits accrediting agencies from compelling such institutions to violate state law and provides a cause of action. The Senate recommended it favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 64</u> adjusts certain Kansas Public Employees Retirement System statutory referencing, extends the time for filing administrative appeals. The Senate recommended it favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 24</u> authorizes the insurance commissioner to set the amount of certain fees. The Senate recommended it favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 2</u> validates the election results of a Greeley County USD 200 bond issues. The Senate recommended it favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 79</u> directs the secretary of the Kansas Department for Children and Families to request a waiver from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program rules that would allow the state to prohibit the purchase of candy and soft drinks with food assistance. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 260</u> amends the Kansas Parimutuel Racing Act regarding the qualification for an organization's license, and the definition of horsemen's associations. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 58</u> modifies the requirements and allocations for multi-year flex accounts. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 166</u> enacts the Fostering Competitive Career Opportunities Act to remove postsecondary degree requirements from state employment considerations. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 117</u> expands the property tax exemption for Strother Field Airport property. The Senate recommended the bill favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 98</u> provides for the Route 66 Association's distinctive Kansas license plate. The Senate recommended the bill favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 18</u> provides the Hunter Nation license plate. The Senate recommended favorably for a final vote without further floor amendments.

<u>Senate Bill 20</u> reduces the number of board members appointed by the commissioner on the insurance-related boards. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 21</u> requires that third-party administrators maintain separate fiduciary accounts for individual payors and contain funds collected or held on behalf of multiple payers and requires that third-party administrators disclose to the commissioner of insurance any bankruptcy petition filed by or on behalf of such administrator pursuant to Chapter 9 or Chapter 11 of the U.S. bankruptcy code. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 22</u> requires title agents to make their audited reports available for inspection. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Sub for Senate Bill 45</u> requires the Kansas Board of Education to calculate graduation rates for all school districts for the purposes of accreditations using alternative calculations. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 128</u> creates an exception to certain mandatory reporting obligations for licensed social workers when working under the supervision of an attorney and permits an attorney to require a licensed social worker to keep ethical obligations of attorney-client privilege while working under the supervision of such attorney. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 222</u> prohibits deference to a state agency's interpretation of a statute, rule or regulation by a state court of officer hearing administrative action. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Sub. for Senate Bill 193</u> exempts law enforcement agencies that do not provide emergency opioid antagonists pursuant to the statewide protocol from the requirement to procure a physician medical director. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 27</u> eliminates the requirement that the commissioner submit certain reports to the governor and removes certain specific entities from the definition of a person for the purpose of enforcing insurance law. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 53</u> provides that the attorney members of the board of trustees of a county law library be appointed by the chief judge of the judicial district. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 199</u> defines the fireworks sales season for seasonal retailers of consumer fireworks and provides for year-round sales by permanent retailers. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 52</u> enacts the Kansas Film and Digital Media Industry Production Development Act and tax credit. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 156</u> creates the crime of unlawful use of a laser pointer and provides criminal penalties. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 157</u> requires warrants issued for failure to appear to be provided to a compensated surety, changes the criteria for setting aside bond forfeiture.

<u>Senate Bill 77</u> requires state agencies to provide a notice of revocation of administrative rules and regulations to the public and removes abolished and inactive state agencies from the agency review requirements. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor.

<u>Senate Bill 13</u> eliminates the requirements for filings for labor organizations. The Senate recommended the bill for a final vote without further amending on the floor. These bills will go before the Senate for a final vote.

First Veto Override of the Legislative Session

Today, the Senate took up <u>Senate Bill 63</u>. The legislation, previously vetoed by Governor Laura Kelly, saw a motion to override the veto that passed the Senate on a vote of <u>31-9</u>, and in the House on a vote of 84-35.

The legislation will now go into effect upon publication in the statute book.
