

# KHA's Current Report April 26, 2024

## President's Perspective - KHA Members Advocate in Washington, DC

Last week, hospital and health system leaders from across the country gathered in Washington, DC, to attend the 2024 American Hospital Association Annual Meeting. AHA assembled an outstanding speaker line-up that included industry leaders, elected officials and political pundits. The AHA Annual Meeting allows hospital leaders to spend time on Capitol Hill advocating to their elected officials.

Kansas hospital leaders had the opportunity to visit with members of the Kansas Congressional Delegation, and their staff, on Capitol Hill. Our topics of conversation broke down into two major categories: workforce and reimbursement. On the workforce front, we were encouraged to find broad support for our drive to protect our hospitals' nurses and grow the pool of potential nursing hires. To that end, we want to thank Senator Jerry Moran for his work on simplifying the process of hiring foreign BSN graduates and Congressman Tracey Mann for cosponsoring a bill to reallocate unused temporary work visas to nurses. Also, kudos to Congressman Jake LaTurner and Congresswoman Sharice Davids for cosponsoring the SAVE Act, which makes it a federal crime to assault a health care worker.

On reimbursement, we continue to educate our delegation on how the insurance industry's lack of accountability to any effective oversight body emboldens them to continuously undermine the 340B Drug Pricing Program, engage in questionable practices for signing up seniors for Medicare Advantage plans and deny coverage for Medicare Advantage beneficiaries indefinitely for procedures generally covered by traditional Medicare. We also discussed the need for extending various Medicare programs like the low-volume hospital and Medicare dependent hospital designations, while rejecting any sequestration increases either in percentage or duration.

We discussed the need to modify the Rural Emergency Hospital program and feel confident a Senate bill will be introduced later this year, as well as a provision on this matter in a larger House Ways and Means Committee rural health care bill. Finally, we discussed the need for providing grant dollars for hospitals struggling to keep up with possible cybersecurity requirements coming out of the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

## **Prairie Dog Culture**

If you have ever seen a prairie dog town, there are sentries posted throughout. Their job is to bark if they see danger. This puts the town on alert and helps protect the collective. What does this have to do with cyber security? Some people are better at spotting adversaries than others. By leveraging them, you can help protect your company overall.

The reality is for companies under 500 employees, one in four phishing emails will be responded to, but only 2 percent will be reported. The trick is to get those who spot the phishing attempt to share it with those who do not. Teaching staff to speak up when they see a phishing attempt will cause others to be more alert when checking their email. It promotes a safety culture of awareness, where everyone is open to asking questions related to these types of attacks, in short, a Prairie Dog Culture.

If you have an internal message board, chat (via Teams, for example) or similar tool, have people post what they see and explain how they spotted it or ask for feedback if they're unsure. If you have a weekly meeting, take turns bringing a real-life example and sharing or simply make it a habit to share via email. Once you create this kind of culture, this will not be a problem; everyone will be on the lookout.

# **CMS Announces Medicaid Access and Quality Rules Release**

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services is set to publish its final rules on Medicaid access and quality for <a href="fee-for-service">fee-for-service</a> and <a href="managed care">managed care</a> programs Friday, May 10. Although the rules include many provisions that will enable coverage and ensure participants have fair access to the benefits to which they are entitled, the managed care rule will require Medicaid enrolled providers to periodically attest whether they are participating in Medicaid provider tax "hold harmless arrangements." Many other provider groups opposed the imposition of this provision, arguing CMS lacks the statutory authority to do so. The final rule defers the implementation of the attestation requirement until January 2028, which will allow time for the legality of the requirement to be reviewed.

#### **CMS Releases Final Long-Term Care Minimum Staffing Regulation**

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>released</u> a final rule containing minimum staffing requirements at long-term care facilities. The rule mandates long-term care facilities to provide a minimum of 3.48 hours per resident day in nursing staff time, including a minimum 0.55 HPRD of R.N. care and 2.45 HPRD of direct nurse aide care. The rule requires an RN on-site 24-7 for skilled nursing care. The rule will be implemented in three phases.

#### **FTC Finalizes Sweeping Rule Barring Noncompete Agreements**

The Federal Trade Commission finalized a <u>rule</u> that would ban noncompete agreements for nearly all occupations in the U.S. Once the rule is effective, employers will be required to notify employees currently subject to a noncompete agreement that the contract is no longer enforceable. The only contracts permitted to stay in effect are those with senior executives, defined as individuals in a policy-making position making more than \$151,164 annually. Employers are prohibited from imposing new noncompete contracts with senior executives after the effective date of the rule.

The FTC's jurisdiction extends to for-profit entities, and numerous commenters to the proposed rule asserted it could not regulate nonprofit or governmental entities. However, the FTC claims in the final rule that such organizations are not "categorically outside the Commission's authority." Because of the rule's far-reaching implications, litigation to stop its implementation is likely. The rule has not yet been published in the *Federal Register* but will take effect 120 days from the publication date.

#### Study Looks at Barriers to Opioid Use Disorder Treatment Among Rural Residents

In 2020, nearly three million people living in rural areas required treatment for a substance use disorder. Of these individuals, only 10 percent received treatment from a specialty facility and less than 1 percent received medication for opioid use disorder. A <u>study</u> published in *Social Science & Medicine* focuses on the unique barriers and challenges faced by patients living in nonmetropolitan areas. Themes include fear of withdrawal, close-knit communities that perpetuate drug use, stigma, limited availability of treatment in rural areas, lack of transportation and treatment facilities with strict, punitive policies, among others. By understanding the roadblocks faced by these community members, we can begin dismantling the policies and procedures creating inequitable access to treatment.
