<u>The Charles S. Billings Award</u> is KHA's highest honor. It recognizes a hospital leader for his or her lifetime of service and continuing contribution to Kansas's health care. This award was established in 1971 to honor Billings' dedication and years of service to Kansans.

The Distinguished Health Care Advocate Award honors individuals, organizations or groups that have made an exemplary contribution to the health and well-being of the people of Kansas through their leadership in the political or policy arena. This awards members of KHA the opportunity to recognize those who work on our behalf from outside our ranks.



The Donald A. Wilson Visionary Award recognizes hospital-related individuals who have made an outstanding, innovative contribution to health care delivery, health care financing or initiatives that improve the health and clinical outcomes of their community. This award was established in 2007 to honor Wilson's dedication and years of service to Kansans.



<u>The Trustee of the Year Award</u> honors a hospital board member who is a leader, gives back to the community and routinely goes beyond the call of duty. KHA members are encouraged to recognize a trustee who has served with distinction and made significant contributions to the betterment of their hospital and community.



The Heart of Health Care Award, previously called the Health Care Worker of the Year Award, recognizes and honors the excellence of health care workers statewide. KHA will recognize all nominated employees (one employee from every hospital) for making a significant contribution to the betterment of their hospital. Any type of employee can be nominated. They can be a tenured employee with years of service or a newer staff member. New this year, there will be additional recognition as a "Rising Star" if your nominee has been in healthcare (or employed in your hospital) for less than five years.



The Workforce Strategies Award recognizes a team of employees, providers or volunteers who worked collaboratively to make a significant contribution to the well-being, retention or recruitment of health care workers at their facility(s) or in Kansas.

# Joint Commission New and Revised Requirements for Infection Prevention and Control Webinar

Effective July 1, 2024, The Joint Commission approved new and revised requirements for the "Infection Prevention and Control" chapter for Critical Access Hospitals and hospitals accredited by The Joint Commission. The IC chapter has been fully rewritten and replaces the current IC chapter for both accreditation programs. The revised chapter focuses on the structures supporting quality and safety.

The Joint Commission is offering a free on-demand webinar to introduce the new and revised requirements for the "Infection Prevention and Control" chapter for CAHs and hospitals accredited by The Joint Commission. The webinar will offer practical examples of how the requirements apply and highlight available resources, including a reference guide and a new infection prevention and control program assessment tool to assist organizations in meeting the requirements. The <u>prepublication reference guide</u> is available from the Joint Commission.

This on-demand webinar offers one CE credit or ACHE-qualifying education hour. To complete the activity, participants must view the recorded content, complete a short reading activity and complete the CE survey and attestation by June 18, 2024. There is no fee to attend this webinar, and there is no limit on the number of a facility's staff who can attend.

### **Federal and National News**

### **CMS Launches New EMTALA Complaint Reporting Option**

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>launched</u> a new option for filing complaints related to possible EMTALA violations. This new reporting option is part of the Biden-Harris Administration's plan to educate the public and promote access to emergency care. Under EMTALA, patients presenting to a hospital seeking care have the right to an appropriate medical screening exam to see if an emergency medical condition exists and treatment until the emergency medical condition is stabilized or an appropriate transfer to another hospital is completed.

Department of Labor Announces Final Rule Updating Hazard Communication Standard The U.S. Department of Labor announced a <u>final rule</u> from OSHA updating the current Hazard Communication Standard to better protect workers. The updated HCS increases the amount and quality of information on labels and safety data sheets and allows workers and first responders to react quickly in an emergency. The updates take effect on July 19.

Aligned primarily with the seventh revision of the United Nations' Globally Harmonized System of Classification and Labelling of Chemicals, the updated standard will require labels on small packaging to be more comprehensive and readable. It also makes changes to help ensure trade secrets no longer prevent workers and first responders from receiving critical hazard information on safety data sheets.

To learn more about <u>hazard communication</u> and the pending changes, OSHA provided short videos about the improved rule available in English and Spanish.

## CDC Issues Health Advisory for International Travel to Saudi Arabia

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention issued a <u>health advisory</u> for cases of meningococcal disease linked to Umrah travel to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. Umrah is an Islamic pilgrimage to Mecca in KSA that can be performed any time in the year. The Hajj is an annual Islamic pilgrimage, taking place June 14-19. Providers are reminded that individuals one year of age and older traveling to KSA should have a current quadrivalent vaccine or booster for meningococcal disease.
