## President's Perspective – Celebrate Safely this Independence Day

Let me be one of the first to wish you a happy Independence Day. I hope all of you take some time to enjoy patriotic festivities with family and friends. We know Kansas hospitals have emphasized safety leading up to this holiday, reminding their communities to stay safe and avoid the most common reasons people travel to the hospital during holiday celebrations.

The Kansas Hospital Association would like to join members of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, the Office of the State Fire Marshal and Safe Kids Kansas in reminding Kansans of the importance of safety on Independence Day. Make sure your festivities follow safety recommendations for fireworks and outdoor grills.

Thanks to data collected through voluntary reporting of Kansas hospitals and administered by the Office of the State Fire Marshal, we know the person igniting the firework is the most likely to be injured, and hands are the most common body part to be injured. The highest incidences of injuries are caused by mortars or artillery fireworks and other fireworks like parachutes, fountains and spinning items. Always use fireworks outdoors and keep a bucket of water or a hose nearby in case of accidents. For more firework safety tips, go the Office of the State Fire Marshal.

Grilling is another favorite part of many Fourth of July gatherings. Ensure that grills are used outdoors only, away from the home, deck railings and under eaves and overhanging branches. Keep children and pets away from the grill area, and never leave your grill unattended. Clean your grill regularly to prevent grease fires.

# Fundraiser, Advocate, Caregiver - Isaac Boone Embodies All

The Kansas Hospital Association's <u>Heart of Health Care Worker Award</u> highlights hospital employees who have made a significant contribution to the betterment of their hospital. These individuals are nominated for this award because they routinely go above and beyond the call of duty.

Isaac Boone is a valuable member of Greenwood County Hospital and the greater Eureka community. As an advocate, Boone uses his expertise to relate how pending legislation affects patients and hospitals. As a pharmacist, he helps patients navigate Medicare supplement plans, provides community education about Medicare Advantage plans and has helped the hospital save more than \$1,000,000 through his work with the 340B Drug Discount Program.

Boone is highly invested in the growth of his community and puts his considerable fundraising skills to work. He was instrumental in setting up a memorial golf tournament for the hospital's foundation. His work on the tournament brings in thousands of dollars to the foundation, which is spent on necessary equipment and supplies for the hospital.

This year, a clinic across the street from the hospital closed. To help the hospital purchase the building, Boone sought donations from various community members and wrote grants. He secured a total of \$205,000, which included a match-day funding event that raised \$82,000.

There isn't anything that Boone wouldn't do for the Greenwood County Hospital, and it shows with each act of service he performs. Team members and other staff members look to Boone for guidance and advice and often jump in to help with projects he starts.

## **Perinatal Behavioral Health One-Day Training**

Kansas Connecting Communities is hosting three FREE, one-day training events focusing on maternal mental health, substance use screening and Medicaid reimbursement. ## K-TRACS Reporting Exemptions Must Be Renewed by Aug. 31

K-TRACS requires pharmacies that dispense controlled substances and drugs of concern to report dispensations by the end of the next business day from when they are sold or otherwise handed over to the patient. However, many Kansas hospital pharmacies are exempt from these requirements based on K.S.A. 65-1682 statutory definitions. Exemptions must be renewed annually by Aug. 31. The pharmacist-in-charge must complete the exemption renewal. Please use the following guidance when submitting your exemption renewal:

<u>Use the online form</u> if the pharmacy meets either of the following criteria:

- K.S.A. 65-1682 (d)(1): A licensed hospital pharmacy that distributes controlled substances and drugs of concern for the purpose of inpatient hospital care only. Select Exemption Option #1. No attachments or documentation are required.
- K.S.A. 65-1682 (d)(2): A medical care facility as defined in K.S.A. 65-425, practitioner or other authorized person who administers controlled substances and drugs of concern. Select Exemption Option #2. No attachments or documentation are required.

K.A.R. 68-21-2 exempts submission of interim supplies of 48 hours or less of controlled substances and drugs of concern. Hospital pharmacies engaged in these practices may select from either option above if they provide interim supplies and no other outpatient dispensing.

When would a hospital pharmacy be required to report to K-TRACS and be ineligible for an exemption?

- If a pharmacy dispenses outpatient prescriptions to employees, those must be reported. The pharmacy is not eligible for an exemption.
- If the hospital dispenses up to three days' supply of buprenorphine to initiate OUD treatment in the emergency department according to <a href="21 CFR Part 1306.07">21 CFR Part 1306.07</a>, those dispensations must be reported. The pharmacy is not eligible for an exemption.

Exemption requests will be reviewed by K-TRACS staff. Dispensers will receive notice by email confirming approval or denial. The email will serve as confirmation and proof of exemption. No exemption certificates are issued.

# Region VII Common Survey Citations Compiled for CAHs, PPS Hospitals, RHC and Nursing Homes

Information is now available on the Kansas Hospital Association <u>regulatory page</u> of the KHA website, compiling the 2024 survey citations for critical access and prospective payment system hospitals, rural health clinics and nursing homes using the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services database for Region VII. Using Region VII provides a much broader picture of what deficiencies surveyors are citing during accreditation, complaint and validation surveys for the states of Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Iowa. These documents will be updated quarterly or semi-annually depending on the frequency of CMS updates to the survey database.

## USDA Launches New Program to Increase Access to Healthy Foods in Rural Communities.

Nutrition has a significant impact on health care outcomes. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack recently <u>announced</u> the Department of Agriculture and the Reinvestment Fund are launching a new program under the <u>Healthy Food Financing Initiative</u> to increase access to healthy foods in communities underserved by grocery stores. Through the HFFI Food Access and Retail Expansion Fund, USDA and the Reinvestment Fund are making available \$60 million in loans, grants and technical assistance for food retail and food retail supply chain projects that increase access to healthy food in communities underserved by grocery stores, including rural areas. If you work with youth aged 5-17, don't forget about the Health Careers Exploration Patch Program. This is a great activity for scout groups, summer camp programs, youth events and more. The program focuses on exploring the need for health care professionals, the many roles they play, education requirements, resources available for those pursuing careers in health care and general health and wellness information.

This program has <u>one curriculum for youth aged 5 to 8</u> and another for <u>youth aged 9 to 17</u>. To earn the Health Careers Exploration Patch, youth select and complete designated activities related to career exploration, educational lessons, skill builders, service projects or technology. #### **Federal and National News**

### **CMS Issues Revised Guidance for LTCF**

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>issued</u> revised guidance for state survey teams based on the recently finalized <u>minimum staffing rule</u>. The revised guidance focuses on the facility assessment, which should be used to drive staffing decisions.

### **HHS Announces Cost Savings for 64 Prescription Drugs**

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services <u>announced</u> certain Medicare enrollees will pay less for 64 drugs available through Medicare Part B beginning Monday, July 1. According to HHS, because of the Inflation Reduction Act, "some people with Medicare who use these drugs during this time period may save between \$1 and \$4,593 per day."

### CMS Releases CY 2025 Proposed ESRD PPS Payment and Policy Update

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>released</u> the proposed calendar year 2025 Medicare End-Stage Renal Disease Prospective Payment System payment and policy <u>updates</u>. CMS estimates Medicare will pay approximately \$7.2 billion during CY 2025, including a rate increase of 0.8 percent. The rule includes proposals for the ESRD quality incentive payment program, ESRD conditions of coverage and changes to the payment for renal dialysis services furnished to individuals with acute kidney injury. Comments about the proposed rule will be accepted through Monday, Aug. 26.

# CMS Releases CY 2025 Proposed Home Health Payment and Policy Update

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>released</u> the Medicare Home Health proposed payment and policy <u>updates</u> for the calendar year 2025. CMS estimates the proposed rule would increase home health payments by 2.5 percent, or \$415 million. However, CMS' rate adjustments consist of a \$595 million decrease due to "behavior adjustments" and a \$100 million decrease that reflects the proposed fixed dollar loss. Once factoring in the payment offsets, CMS estimates a net decrease of 1.7 percent, or \$280 million. Comments about the proposed rule will be accepted through Monday, Aug. 26.

### **Texas Court Invalidates OCR Guidance on Website Tracking Technologies**

Last week, the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas <u>ruled</u> the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Civil Rights guidance regarding hospitals' use of third-party vendors to track website activity was invalid. The plaintiffs included the American Hospital Association and the Texas Hospital Association, who challenged OCR guidance asserting that allowing technology vendors access to public-facing websites would violate HIPAA where the vendor had access to a user's IP address and search history, which may involve information about health conditions.

During the litigation, OCR revised its guidance to narrow the scope of possible HIPAA violations, but the court held that the new bulletin unlawfully exceeded the agency's authority.

### **Supreme Court Eliminates Deference to Agency Action**

The U.S. Supreme Court <u>invalidated</u> a decades-old standard for evaluating executive branch agency action. The Chevron doctrine required courts reviewing agency rulemaking and administrative proceedings to defer to the agency's subject matter expertise in interpreting and applying ambiguous federal statutes. Under the ruling, courts must exercise their independent judgment in deriving the meaning of statutory provisions. The ruling is expected to profoundly impact federal agencies' power and scope of authority over-regulated industries.

### Before You Go ...

The Health Resources and Services Administration <u>announced</u> \$4 million in available funding for the Rural Hospital Stabilization Pilot Program. Grant funds will be used to provide in-depth technical assistance to rural hospitals to enhance and/or expand service lines to ensure local access to care and improve hospital finances. Grant applications are due Friday, July 26.
