Limited Spots Still Available for Advocacy All-Star Training

Learn the Latest about MASA Access – Sept. 17

Join KHSC staff for a free webinar at 2:00 p.m. on Sept. 17 when MASA Access representatives share how it partners with providers and works with your health care plan to ensure your employees can access comprehensive coverage, helping them avoid unexpected expenses during emergencies. KHSC has connected more than 90 organizations with the benefits offered by MASA Access. MASA Access pays enrolled employees and their family members who experience costs because of emergency group or air ambulance services.

MASA empowers employees to:

- Never hesitate to call 911 in an emergency
- Access coverage for any ambulance (ground or air) nationwide
- Get coverage for medical transport claims

Learn how MASA Access covers the gaps in health plans related to emergency ground and air transportation. While health insurance plans may provide some coverage, 79 percent of all ground ambulance rides could result in an out-of-network bill. With MASA, no service is "out of network." It is common for air ambulance rides to cost employees thousands of dollars in out-of-pocket costs. MASA solves that issue as well.

2024-25 Flu Season Recommendations

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices published its <u>2024-2025 Influenza Season recommendations</u>. Routine annual influenza vaccination is recommended for all persons aged older than six months who do not have contraindications. Trivalent inactivated influenza vaccines, trivalent recombinant influenza vaccine and trivalent live attenuated influenza vaccine are expected to be available.

All persons should receive an age-appropriate influenza vaccine, with the exception that solid organ transplant recipients aged 18 through 64 years who are receiving immunosuppressive medication regimens may receive either high-dose inactivated influenza vaccine or adjuvanted inactivated influenza vaccine as acceptable options (without a preference over other age-appropriate IIV3s or RIV3). Except for vaccination for adults aged older than 65 years, ACIP makes no preferential recommendation for a specific vaccine when more than one licensed and recommended vaccine is available.

ACIP recommends that adults aged older than 65 years preferentially receive any one of the following higher-dose or adjuvanted influenza vaccines: trivalent high-dose inactivated influenza vaccine, trivalent recombinant influenza vaccine or trivalent adjuvanted inactivated influenza vaccine. If none of these three vaccines is available at an opportunity for vaccine administration, then any other age-appropriate influenza vaccine should be used.

All influenza vaccines available in the United States during the 2024–25 season will be trivalent vaccines containing hemagglutinin derived from 1) an influenza A/Victoria/4897/2022 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus (for egg-based vaccines) or an influenza A/Wisconsin/67/2022 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus (for cell culture-based and recombinant vaccines); 2) an influenza A/Thailand/8/2022 (H3N2)-like virus (for egg-based vaccines) or an influenza A/Massachusetts/18/2022 (H3N2)-like virus (for cell culture-based and recombinant vaccines); and 3) an influenza B/Austria/1359417/2021 (Victoria lineage)-like virus.

Updated (2024 – 2025) COVID-19 Vaccines Approved

Last week, the Food and Drug Administration approved the Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna updated (2024 – 2025 formulation) COVID-19 vaccines. Here are the highlights from the FDA approval announcement.

The updated mRNA COVID-19 vaccines include Comirnaty and Spikevax, both of which are approved for individuals 12 years of age and older, and the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine and Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine, both of which are authorized for emergency use for individuals six months through 11 years of age. Manufacturers were expected to begin shipping their updated vaccines immediately upon approval.

What You Need to Know

Unvaccinated individuals six months through four years of age can receive three doses of the updated, authorized Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine or two doses of the updated, authorized Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine.

Individuals six months through four years of age who have previously been vaccinated against COVID-19 are eligible to receive one or two doses of the updated, authorized Moderna or Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccines (timing and number of doses to administer depends on the previous COVID-19 vaccine received).

Individuals five years through 11 years of age, regardless of previous vaccination, are eligible to receive a single dose of the updated, authorized Moderna or Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccines; if previously vaccinated, the dose is administered at least two months after the last dose of any COVID-19 vaccine.

Individuals 12 years of age and older are eligible to receive a single dose of the updated, approved Comirnaty or the updated, approved Spikevax; if previously vaccinated, the dose is administered at least two months after the last dose of any COVID-19 vaccine.

Additional doses are authorized for certain immunocompromised individuals ages six months through 11 years of age as described in the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine and Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine fact sheets.
