Reimbursement Form for Involuntary Patient Holds New Updated Link

In 2023, the Kansas Hospital Association worked with the legislature to pass a program allowing reimbursement to hospitals for round-the-clock patient observation and the transportation costs of involuntary admission of patients to state hospitals. The Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services updated its website, and the forms for reimbursement are now updated. The form can be found by visiting KDADS Form for Involuntary Patients. Hospitals seeking reimbursement must fill out a W-9 form for payment.

CNA Course Time Limit Clarification from KDADS

This week, the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services clarified time limits for classroom time versus clinical time in Certified Nurse Assistant programs.

KDADS has concluded that classroom time for a CNA course should not exceed eight hours per day and not exceed 9:00 p.m., with breaks and lunch excluded. KDADS also concluded that Part II clinical times for CNA programs should not exceed 12 hours per day, with breaks and lunch excluded, and not exceed 9:00 p.m.

KDADS reminds CNA programs to contact the Kansas Department of Labor when teaching students under 18 years of age to ensure compliance with the state's child labor laws. --Jaron Caffrey

KHA HIDI Advantage Optics Update and HIDI Academy Learning

Advantage Optics, the online reporting tool accessed from the HIDI Advantage User Portal, is where your KHA hospital-level data resides. This week, the site was updated with the July 2024 data and now contains October 2018 – July 2024 inpatient, outpatient and emergency department discharges. This includes Executive Snapshot Dashboards, located under Market Optics.

As a reminder, HIDI recently launched the HIDI Academy. This new service is designed to enhance the learning experience for users by providing access to HIDI-specific Market Optics training modules and resources through a user-friendly interface.

Federal and National News

CMS Releases Medicare Shared Savings Program Final Rule

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>released</u> a <u>final rule</u> regarding the impact of significant, anomalous and highly suspect billing activity on Medicare Shared Savings Program financial calculations in calendar year 2023. CMS determined that two specific HCPCS codes -- A4352 and A4353 -- displayed significant, anomalous and highly suspect billing activity. Because of the findings, CMS will adjust selected shared savings program calculations to exclude all Medicare Parts A and B payment amounts on DMEPOS claims associated with A4352 and A4353 in CY 2023.

CDC Issues Health Update on Mpox Clade I Outbreak

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently issued a <u>health update</u> that provides additional information about the ongoing outbreak of the clade I monkeypox virus that causes mpox, in central and eastern Africa, particularly in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. This alert offers updated situational awareness, vaccination and travel guidance.

Transmission in endemic regions typically occurs through contact with infected wildlife, but person-to-person spread via close or sexual contact also has been reported. While clade I mpox has not been detected outside central Africa, travelers to affected regions should be aware of the risks and consider vaccination if they anticipate certain sexual exposures. Monitoring continues in the U.S., where the ongoing clade II mpox outbreak remains a concern.

Before You Go ...

- A National Institutes of Health <u>study</u> shows that fewer than half of U.S. jails provide any form of medication to individuals with opioid use disorder. Findings from the study highlight critical gaps in treatment access in correctional facilities, where almost twothirds of people have a substance use disorder.
- For the first time in decades, public health <u>data shows</u> a sudden decline in drug overdose deaths across the <u>U.S. National surveys</u> compiled by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention already show an unprecedented decline in drug deaths of roughly 10.6 percent.
- Many individuals using medications to combat addiction, like methadone and buprenorphine, are <u>losing</u> their Medicaid coverage due to the expiration of federal pandemic protections. Researchers at the nonprofit think tank KFF estimate that more than 1 million low-income Americans depend on the federal-state program for life-saving addiction care.
