Quarterly Credit Balance Reports No Longer Required

Starting Dec. 1, 2024, providers are no longer required to submit <u>Credit Balance Reports</u> (PDF) (CMS-838) every quarter. You're still required to report self-identified overpayments, but you should only use a Credit Balance Report when they occur. Find the <u>official message here</u>. --Shannan Flach

CMS Updates eCQI Resource Center

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services updated the <u>Electronic Clinical Quality</u> <u>Improvement Resource Center</u>. Updates include new webpages dedicated to the <u>Quality</u> <u>Improvement Core</u> standard for expressing clinical quality information. QI-Core is a Health Level Seven International implementation guide that defines a set of profiles to support the successful creation of interoperable and quality-focused applications, including Electronic Clinical Quality Measures.

The QI-Core content includes information about:

- QI-Core alignment with US Core
- Harmonization with Fast Healthcare Interoperability Resources profiles
- Tools and Resources
- Educational videos and webinars
- Ways to connect and engage with other interested parties

Whooping Cough Cases Surge in Kansas

Kansas marked the end of 2024 with the largest spike of whooping cough (pertussis) cases in nearly a decade. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention lists <u>241 cases in Kansas</u> in 2024, compared to 66 cases in 2023. The CDC recommends <u>vaccination</u> as the best way to prevent pertussis. However, as typical infection patterns return to the United States, the CDC expects pertussis cases to increase in unvaccinated and vaccinated populations. Pertussis occurs in vaccinated people since <u>protection from vaccination fades over time</u>. --*Karen Braman*

Seeking Adjuncts for New MBA in Health Care Leadership Program

Tabor College is launching a new MBA in Health Care Leadership program this spring. The college is looking for adjuncts to teach the following courses:

Health Care Finance – Health care leaders must possess the skills to navigate complex financial systems, make strategic financial decisions and ensure the fiscal sustainability of health care organizations. This course will provide an overview of financial management in health care. Topics may include health care reimbursement systems, health care cost management and the economic impact of financial decisions.

Data Analysis and Decision Making – As the need for data analysis grows, understanding how to collect, analyze and interpret health care data is crucial for optimizing clinical processes, enhancing patient care and guiding strategic initiatives and strategic planning. This course is designed to equip students with the skills and knowledge needed to harness the power of data for informed decision-making and explore current trends in data analysis.

Health Care Policy and Administration – Students will analyze health care policy development and implementation at local and national levels and examine the influence of political, economic, and social factors on health care policy. The course will provide insights into the complexities of health care systems and the role of stakeholders in shaping policy decisions. Course instruction will provide students with the tools to understand the policy landscape, navigate regulatory frameworks and master administrative strategies in health care organizations.

Newborn Blood Spot Collection: Timing of Collection and Importance of Timeliness

Some conditions on the newborn screening panel can cause permanent disability or even death in as little as five days. Timely collection and shipping of a satisfactory specimen is critical for early identification and intervention, possibly preventing the condition's progression. Seventeen conditions screened are considered time-critical. For healthy babies, blood spot collection should occur between 24 and 48 hours of birth. Results of a newborn screen collected before 24 hours of birth are considered invalid because the analytes in the baby's blood are not independent of the mother's blood. An invalid result means another blood spot collection must complete the screening process. A NICU baby will have a blood spot collection taken based on hospital policy for admission. A blood spot screening should be conducted again for NICU babies between 48 and 72 hours of birth. The Kansas Newborn Screening Program strives to meet national standards by reporting time-critical results within five days of birth and all other results within seven days. Funding Opportunity – Rural Communities Opioid Response Program – Overdose Response

The Rural Communities Opioid Response Program – Overdose Response through the Health Resources and Services Administration is a one-year program supporting improved health care in rural areas by addressing their immediate and short-term needs related to the provision of substance use disorder services. RCORP – Overdose Response aims to reduce and prevent the risk of overdoses in rural areas. HRSA will make approximately 20 awards of up to \$300,000 each. The RCORP-Overdose Response Program will support specific, short-term substance use disorder prevention, treatment and recovery activities, as well as work related to capacity building, supportive services and special populations. Allowable activities are defined in the <u>notice of</u> <u>funding opportunity</u>. Eligible organizations include all domestic public or private, non-profit or for-profit entities.

Federal and National News

Congress Enacts Short-term Spending Measure

Following a tumultuous week of Republican infighting and closed-door negotiations, Congress enacted the <u>American Relief Act, 2025</u> (H.R. 10545). The measure funds the federal government through Friday, March 14, 2025, and includes several provisions of interest to hospitals.

Key items include the delay of the Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital cuts through Monday, March 31, 2025, and the extension of the enhanced Medicare low-volume payment adjustment, Medicare Dependent Hospital program and Medicare telehealth flexibilities and hospital at-home program through that same date.
